"Tell me something Good..."

Tell Me Something Good is kindly shared, herein, by DD & Tom Dawson.

Rescuing animals has always been something we've been passionate about. Our dogs and cats and even our horses and donkey all came to us from owner surrenders, rescue organizations or



"friends of friends" needing to find homes for pets. Our house is full ... and when we say full, we mean full of animals ... and their hair! We can give donations to different pet rescue organizations, but we wondered what we could do where we could interact with more dogs and more people, and frankly see our efforts help the animal(s) in need. Enter I-81 Transports Facebook Group. The I-81 Transport Team is an ALL VOLUNTEER group that transport dogs (and even some cats) from a shelter or humane society, where the animal was either seized or surrendered,

to a rescue/adoption organization, foster home, or adoption placement home. The transports are segmented into approximately one-hour "legs," and drivers sign up to transport and meet other drivers at designated spots to get the animals to their final destination. When we signed up, we indicated we could drive from Lexington, VA to Winchester, VA on I-81. Since March of 2022, we have transported 65 dogs. Most of our transports are single dogs. We have had some, however, that are multiple dogs on one trip – either all from the same home, a mother dog and puppies, or just coming from the same shelter. We've had large dogs and very, very small

dogs. One time, we even had a Great Pyrenees and a Chihuahua in the same transport! One of our favorite transports was a black and tan coon dog in November of 2022 that was picked up as a hunting stray in Flatwoods, West Virginia and heading to the Black and Tan Coon Hound Rescue organization that will make sure he finds a good home. Tom really liked sweet Cooper and apparently Cooper really liked Tom. One of our transport friends took this picture of Tom and Cooper when we met them in Lexington, VA for our pickup.

In December of 2022, we transported sweet Bella from Charlottesville, VA to Verona, VA. She was owner surrendered in Raleigh, NC and heading to Osceola Mills, PA, where she would be fostered. She

was a sweet



English Setter, who was traveling with her bed, her toys, several pretty collars, a heart-shaped tag with her name on it, and some grooming brushes. Apparently, her person took a job out of the country and could not take her beloved pup. She was so very sweet and timid. We loved her so much, and even applied to adopt her after the transport. Unfortunately we were not selected, but we are sure her new family loves her so much. Here is a picture of DD wishing her well on the next leg of her journey.

The latest transport we did was for sweet Bosley. His person passed away and no family members could take him. He had the cutest underbite, and we are sure he will be adopted very quickly and loved beyond compare. Godspeed sweet Bosley.

Transport of these animals would not be possible without the coordinators who set up the transport, identifying the route and the legs of the trip as well as posting about the transport and soliciting for drivers. Once we sign up for a transport, we are in constant communication with the transport coordinator and other drivers via Face



communication with the transport coordinator and other drivers via Facebook Messenger. That way we know if there are traffic delays or change in transfer locations for some reason.

In March of 2023, we were transporting Lenny from Harrisonburg to Winchester. He was coming from Charleston, WV and heading to New Jersey. Lenny would not leave the vehicle when it arrived here at Eagle Carpet from Lexington. Here is what our transport coordinator, Cliff Bethke, wrote on Facebook in the I-81 Transports Group: "When an animal is in need, you never know where help will come from. On today's transport, poor Lenny became afraid, overwhelmed and refused to exit his driver's car for transfer in Harrisonburg VA. The folks at Eagle Carpet offered the use of their indoor warehouse so he could be safely convinced to move. Betty, Michelle and Denise (DD) got the job done, and Lenny will spend a few days with Kari to decompress before finishing his trip to One Love Animal Rescue Group Inc. in New Jersey." The animal and his/her needs always come first.

We are always happy to talk about our transports, and we try to do at least one every month – and we often take pictures of the sweet pups we transport. We meet the very nicest people that share our love for animals. If you are ever interested in learning more about this organization or even want to try your first transport, we'll be happy to tell you about it and even accompany you on your first transport! Once you do your first transport, you'll become a transport junkie! It truly is something good!!

I wish to extend my sincere thanks to DD for her patience and continued help in making this newsletter better each month.
